Frankenstein, Mary Shelley

When it comes to asking the hard questions at the heart of scientific investigation, perhaps no book has ever topped Frankenstein. The classic novel, which turns 200 in 2018, is the heart of One State / One Story, an ambitious statewide read offered in partnership with the Indiana State Library.





Why Frankenstein? There are few works of classic literature that speak so directly to our contemporary world as Mary Shelley's *Frankenstein*. Begun in 1816 and published in 1818, the book raises big questions about science and its role in society. Join us as we use the text to answer questions about how we decipher what's right and wrong, how we understand ourselves in relation to the world around us, and how we live in the world—questions that are as important today as they were in Mary Shelley's time.

Obsessed with the secret of creation, Swiss scientist Dr. Victor Frankenstein cobbles together a body he's determined to bring to life. And one fateful night, he does. When the creature opens his eyes, the doctor is repulsed: his vision of perfection is, in fact, a hideous monster. Dr. Frankenstein abandons his creation, but the monster won't be ignored, setting in motion a chain of violence and terror that shadows Victor to his death.



Mary Shelley's Frankenstein, a gripping story about the ethics of creation and the consequences of trauma, is one of the most influential Gothic novels in British literature. It is as relevant today as it is haunting.

own (secret!) detective agency. The only problem? They have nothing to investigate.
